By providing valuable information about controlled substance prescriptions that are dispensed in the state, it will help healthcare professionals in their prescribing and dispensing decisions. The ePDMP also bolsters the ability of pharmacies, healthcare professionals, law enforcement agencies, and public health officials to work together to reduce the misuse, abuse, and diversion of prescribed controlled substance medications.

The WI ePDMP System Development provides interactive web visualizations about the controlled substance prescriptions dispensed in Wisconsin, the law enforcement reports submitted to the WI ePDMP, and the use of the WI ePDMP by healthcare professionals and others.
